A. Speech acts. Direct and indirect speech acts

Exercise 1: Identify the speech act performed in each of the following utterances:

- 1. Would you like to come to my party this Saturday?
- 2. I will definitely hand in my essay by Friday.
- 3. What time is it?
- 4. Have a biscuit.
- 5. Awful weather!
- 6. Sorry I'm late. The bus was late.
- 7. Passengers are kindly requested to fasten their seat belts.
- 8. Come in and shut the door behind you.
- 9. There's a bee behind your ear.
- 10. If you don't give me the money now, you're a dead man.
- 11. Shall I get you some coffee?
- 12. I hereby declare the meeting closed.
- 13. Can't you make a little less noise?
- 14. Closed between 12 and 2 p.m.
- 15. Oh, Jesus, there he goes again.
- 16. (in a bookshop) Where is the linguistics section, please?
- 17. The exam is next week.
- 18. Get out of this room right now! 3.
- 19. I promise to be here tomorrow by 6 a.m.
- 20. Thank you very much. It was so kind of you to come.

- 5. If you don't pay me by noon, you're a dead man!

Exercise 3: In the following utterances is the speaker appealing to the addressee's positive or negative face?

- 3. I hope this is not too much trouble for you, but could you bring all the books back by tomorrow afternoon?
- 4. I know this is too much to ask, but could you take me to the airport tomorrow?
