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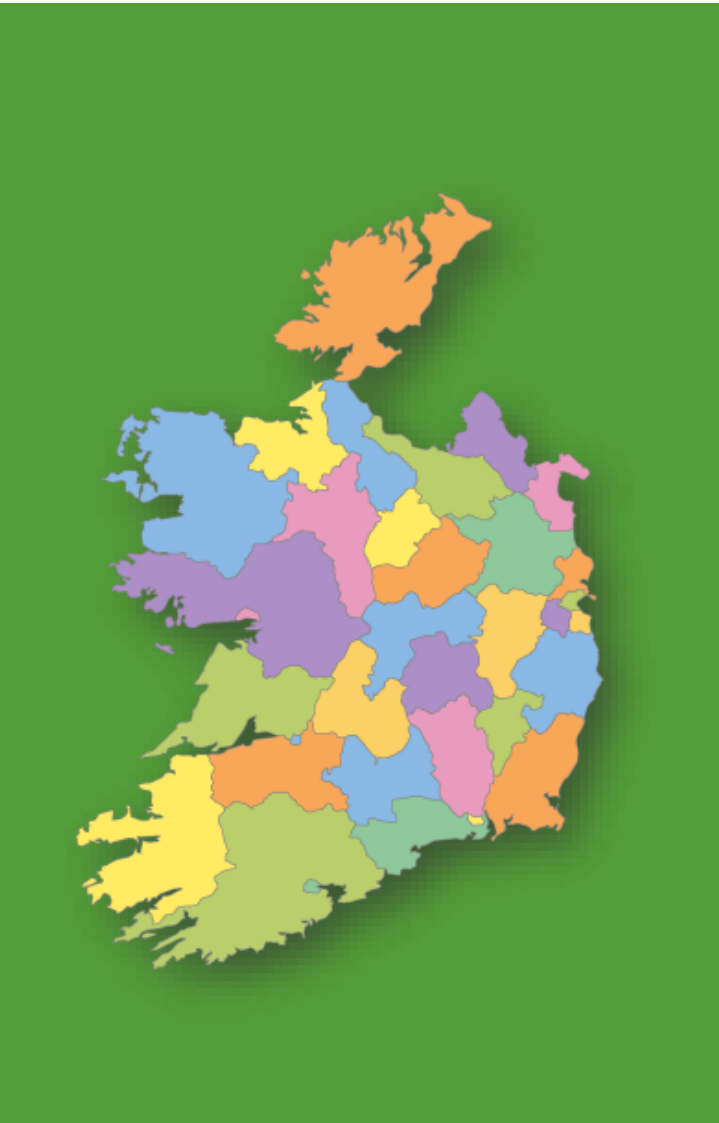


Factors that influence Ireland's european policies



- **Size:** One of the smallest EU member-states
 - approx. 70.000 km²
 - approx. 5.345.000 population
- **Place on the map:**
 - Geographically isolated from the European continent
 - Only land border with the UK (Northern Ireland)
 - North Atlantic Ocean – Irish Sea

Factors that influence Ireland's european policies



- **Year of accession:**

Ireland joined the EEC in 1973

- **History:**

- Ireland was a part of the British Commonwealth
- Irish Free State 1922
- Irish Civil War (1922-23)
- The Troubles (1968-98) — Northern Ireland
- Ireland's non participation in WWII and the Cold War

Factors that influence Ireland's european policies



- **Economy:**

- Close economic ties with the UK (reason for joining EEC)
- Twice the average GDP per capita of the EU (211%)
- Net beneficiary (1973-2018) → Net contributor (2019-)
- Budget surplus 1.3% (2023)
- Bailout package in 2010

Ireland's Trade in Goods 2022

Exports (%)

- UK: 10,6%
- US: 30,2%
- EU: 38,5%*
- Rest of world (China etc.): 20,4%

Imports (%)

- UK: 20,8%
- US: 15,8%
- EU: 30,2%*
- Rest: 33%

* Figures differ from Eurostat 2022

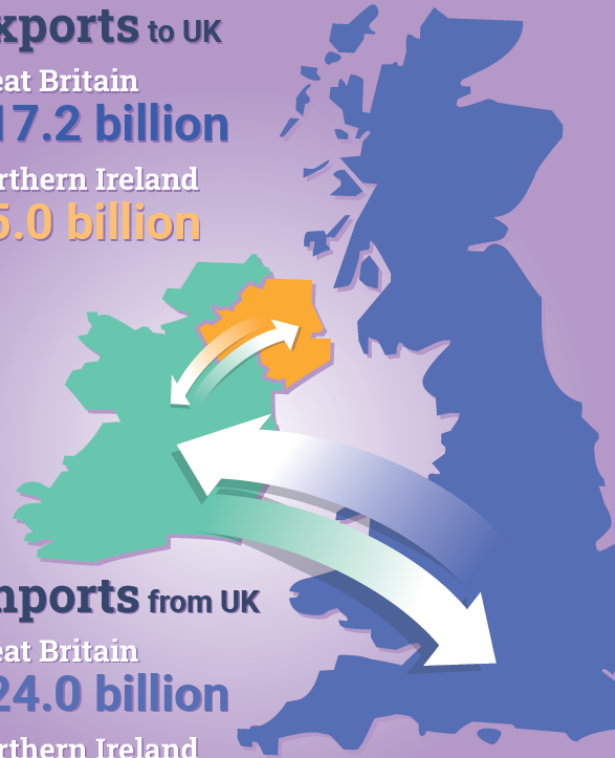

Factors that influence Ireland's european policies



- Ireland is a **neutral** state
 - Not a part of NATO
- Participation in **peace-keeping** operations
- **Domestic political situation:**
 - Multi-party political system
 - Coalition Governments
 - 2 Parliamentary Chambers
Dáil Éireann, Seanad Éireann

Factors that influence Ireland's european policies

Majority: 81 seats



- **Head of State / President:** Michael Higgins
- **Prime Minister:** Simon Harris (Fine Gael)

- **Political parties in Ireland:**
 1. Fine Gael (50)
 2. Fianna Fáil (38)
 3. Sinn Féin (37 seats out of 160)
 4. Labour Party (7)
 5. People before Profit (6)
 6. Green Party (2)
- **Representation in the EP:**
 - Renew Europe: Fianna Fáil
 - GUE-NGL: Sinn Féin
 - EPP: Fine Gael
 - Greens/EFA: Green Party

“Why and What Europe?”



- **Why did Ireland join the EEC?**

- British application
- Common Market
- Common Agricultural Policy (CAP)

- **What Europe does Ireland want?**

- Ireland in Eurozone, not Schengen
- EU budget contributor
Approx. €3.5 billion (2021-22)
(Source: European Commission)
- Ireland is a tax haven

“Why and What Europe?”



Irish Neutrality

- Ireland has been militarily neutral since 1922
 - ↳ participation in peace-keeping operations
- Participation in the CSDP
Common Security and Defence Policy
- Participation in NATO Partnership for Peace

• Withdrawal Agreement



• Good Friday Agreement 1998

• No hard border on the island



• Protocol on Ireland/Northern Ireland

• Single Market
• Common Travel Area

Ireland & Brexit



- Windsor Framework 2023
- “Green” and “Red” lanes



- Brexit Adjustment Reserve
- €5.37 billion
- €1 billion to Ireland (2021-2023)

Ireland & the Ukraine War



- **Ireland in support of Ukraine**
- €380 million of aid to Ukraine

- 105,000 Ukrainians have fled to Ireland (2024)
- Public opinion polls in favor of maintaining Ireland's military neutrality policy

Euroscepticism in Ireland



- 83% in favor of joining the EEC in 1973
- 73% against leaving the EU
Eurobarometer 101, Spring 2024
- 88% in favor of the Euro
Eurobarometer 101, Spring 2024
- 46% in favor of the direction the EU is taking
Eurobarometer 101, Spring 2024
- 2 eurosceptic parties expressing soft policy scepticism (Sinn Féin, PbP)

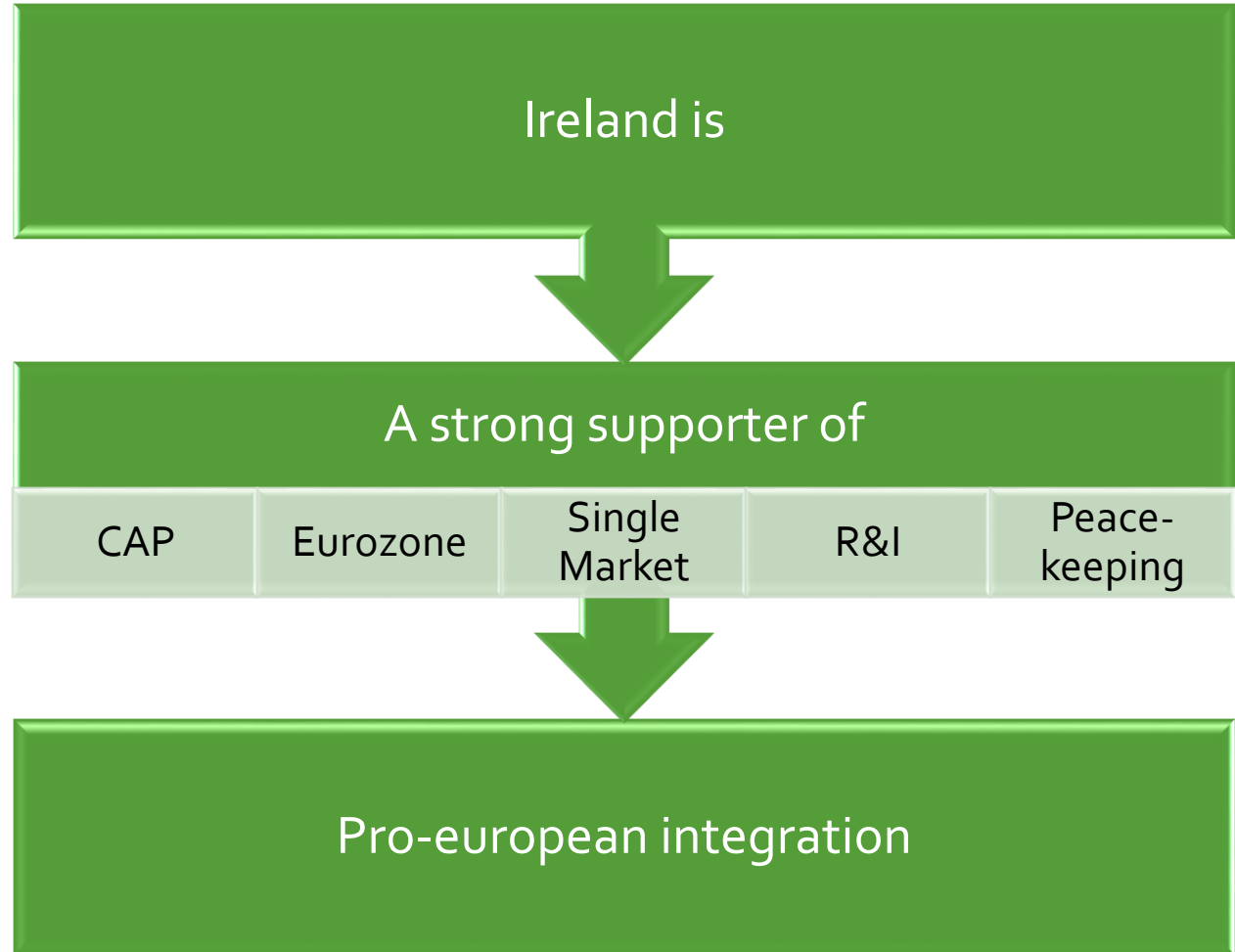
Euroscepticism in Ireland




9 EU-related Referendums 1973-2012

- **Accession to the EEC (1973)**
 - 83% Yes,
- **Treaty on SEA (1987)**
 - 70% Yes, 30% No
- **Treaty of Maastricht (1992)**
 - 70% Yes, 30% No
- **Treaty of Amsterdam (1998)**
 - 62% Yes, 38% No
- **Nice Treaty 1 (2001)**
 - 46% Yes, 54% No
- **Nice Treaty 2 (2002)**
 - 63% Yes, 37% No
- **Lisbon Treaty 1 (2008)**
 - 47% Yes, 53% No
- **Lisbon Treaty 2 (2009)**
 - 67% Yes, 33% No
- **Fiscal Treaty (2012)**
 - 60% Yes, 40% No
